From Wellington & Hhe North Island

Start your journey off with an incredible cruise through the Marlborough Sounds, on the ferry from Wellington to Picton. Bring the car, bike, boat or caravan onboard and start your holiday off by relaxing and admiring the views.

Or admire Marlborough wine country and the Sounds from above by flying directly to Blenheim or Picton from Wellington, Auckland, Christchurch or Paraparaumu.

From Nelson

Less than an hour's drive from Nelson, just before Rai Valley, the roads to French Pass and Tennyson Inlet lead into the beautiful Marlborough Sounds and days worth of exploring.

Or continue along the main highway, stopping at Pelorus Bridge for river swimming, and at Havelock for their famous Greenshell[™] Mussels. Take the scenic Queen Charlotte Drive to Picton or Kenepuru and Pelorus Sound/Te Hoiere Sounds; or continue straight into the heart of wine country and Blenheim.

From Kaikoura & Canterbury

Travel by car, bus or the Coastal Pacific train from Christchurch to Picton and enjoy spectacular scenery. Stop for fresh crayfish at seaside cafés and spot the plentiful seals.

Or take the adventurous road to Marlborough, by vehicle, mountain bike or guided tour, via the historic high country Molesworth Station and beautiful Awatere Valley. Open in spring and summer.

From the West Coast

Arrive via the beautiful Wairau Valley, watching Marlborough's vast wine country unfold as you drive alongside the Wairau River and the rugged Richmond Range. Stop for fly fishing or at cellar doors for tastings, platters or lunch.

Journeys to Marlborough

Your journey to Marlborough is almost as good as being here. Whether you're arriving by ferry, train, car or plane, the scenery is more beautiful the closer you get.

The viewing decks of Bluebridge or Interislander ferries are the perfect way to admire the stunning Marlborough coastline, followed by the calm natural beauty of the Marlborough Sounds.

Spot dolphins and humpback whales during their winter migration, and take in the many turquoise bays and coves of Tory Channel/Kura te Au and Queen Charlotte Sound/Tōtaranui, fringed by native bush, before arriving in picturesque Picton/Waitohi. And when the ferry has berthed, starting your Marlborough experience is as simple as driving off the ramp and into your holiday, or walking the short distance into Picton's town centre.

From the south, the Coastal Pacific train is a great way to really enjoy the scenery without the distraction of the road. Sit back with a coffee or lunch while you're taken on an incredible trip along the wild Kaikōura coastline, before a leisurely journey through Marlborough's rolling hills, the Wairau Lagoons and vineyards. Your rail experience is topped off with an impressive descent into Picton from The Elevation, and a viaduct over the Waitohi River.

Marlborough is well-connected by air, with daily flights from the main centres into Marlborough Airport near Blenheim and Koromiko Airport near Picton. As you approach, be sure to take in the true scale of New Zealand's largest wine region from the air, with vineyards spreading far and wide into valleys and foothills, all the way to the Pacific Coast. On arrival in Marlborough, you're mere minutes from the nearest cellar doors and Golden Mile of wine, while Koromiko is just a short shuttle ride from Picton and the Marlborough Sounds.

Arriving by car means stopping wherever you want, whenever you want. To make the most of Marlborough, be sure to take your time and enjoy all there is to see and do. Enjoy lunch by the Pacific Ocean in Kekerengu or Greenshell[™] Mussels in Havelock, indulge in a winery tasting in the Wairau Valley or stop at the many beautiful viewpoints and bush walks along Queen Charlotte Drive. Whatever highway brings you to Marlborough, you'll be sure to find something brilliant along the way.



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AV. DAILY MAX TEMP

SPRING 1 September - 30 November

Spring marks the release of Marlborough's newest sauvignon blanc, best enjoyed with a platter or lunch at a cellar door. Enjoy sunshine with a vineyard tour under blue skies and snow on the mountains.

Make the most of warm spring days on a Marlborough Sounds beach, and explore with a scenic cruise or by kayak.

AV. DAILY MAX TEMP 23°C | 74°F

SUMMER 1 December - 28 February

Summer in Marlborough is about jumping off jetties into sparkling seas, lazing over a long vineyard lunch with deliciously crisp sauvignon blanc, and cooling off in a crystal-clear river after a bush walk.

Explore the Queen Charlotte Track on foot or by mountain bike, stopping at lodges along the way for lunch or for longer. Board a scenic or seafood cruise to enjoy the Marlborough Sounds scenery. Taste fresh summer flavours by picking your own cherries and blueberries.



AUTUMN 1 March - 31 May

Autumn in Marlborough is an exciting time on the wine calendar, with vintage in full swing. Do a cellar door tour as the grapes are brought into the wineries, while tasting the results of harvests gone by.

See the grapevines change to autumn hues – each block a different colour, depending on the variety. Enjoy nature's spectacular palette from high on the Wither Hills, the hillside road to Pukatea/Whites Bay, or above the Awatere Valley. WINTER 1 June - 31 August

AV. DAILY MAX TEMP 13°C | 55°F

With brilliant crisp blue skies and abundant sunshine, winter is Marlborough's best hidden secret. Enjoy an outdoor vineyard lunch in the afternoon warmth, or cosy up by an open fire with a rich pinot noir at a cellar door.

The glassy, still waters of the Marlborough Sounds, with abundant marine wildlife, makes winter the perfect time to explore. Do a scenic cruise or nestle into a warm waterside lodge with incredible views. Or, embrace winter at Rainbow Ski Area and hit the slopes.

NOVEMBER

Rapaura Springs Garden Marlborough

Visit a selection of Marlborough's most stunning private gardens in town and country, which open their gates just for the popular full and half day tours. Attend workshops with garden and landscaping experts, and be sure to visit the popular Garden Fête and Garden Party.

JANUARY

Picton Maritime Festival

Celebrate beside the sea at the Picton Maritime Festival on the foreshore, with live music and entertainment for all ages, delicious food, free boat rides, rowing lessons, on the water demonstrations and the ever-popular raft race, a festival favourite that's as fun for participants as it is for spectators.

FEBRUARY

Marlborough Wine & Food Festival

Marlborough's flagship event is a must-do, with the region's most incredible wines served alongside delicious food full of local flavours and live music. Come along to New Zealand's longest-running wine festival for a brilliant day among the vines.

MARCH

Havelock Mussel & Seafood Festival

Enjoy the best of Marlborough's delicious seafood alongside local wine, gin and beer in the summer sun, with live music and entertainment for the whole family. Taste Havelock's famous Greenshell[™] Mussels, Marlborough salmon and much more, enter the best dressed competition and watch the exciting mussel shucking competition.

APRI

Yealands Classic Fighters Airshow Omaka (biennial)

At Omaka Airfield near Blenheim, this incredible event draws magnificent aircraft and enthusiasts from all over New Zealand for thrilling air displays and dramatic live reenactments of historic and war events on the ground. The event is held biennially, normally at Easter.

Whitehaven Grape Ride

Join one of New Zealand's most scenic bike races, from the exhilarating straights of Marlborough wine country to the incredible scenery of the Marlborough Sounds and back. Choose from the classic Graperide or longer Magnum, shorter Taster or Mountain Bike courses.

MAY

Saint Clair Vineyard Half

Run, walk or mix it up with this iconic and picturesque half marathon or 12km course among the rows of private vineyards. There's treats and surprises at every turn, from local chocolate, honey and ice cream, to live bands, and your achievement is rewarded at the end thanks to Saint Clair Family Estate.

Feast Marlborough

The Bayleys Friday Night Feast is one of the most popular events on Blenheim's culinary calendar, when Marlborough's finest produce and talented chefs, live entertainment and festive vibes converge into a fantastic night in the town centre.

JUNE/JULY

Matariki events

Matariki is a cluster of stars (Pleiades) that rises in mid-winter, marking the start of the Māori New Year. This significant and meaningful time of the year is celebrated with events in the community. Check local events guides to find what's on.

JULY

Marlborough Book Festival

The Marlborough Book Festival is an annual winter weekend of wonderful writers, curious audiences and thought-provoking conversations. Choose from a great lineup of top authors, hear them discuss their lives and works in conversation with skilled interviewers, and have your book signed.

OCTOBER

Marina 2 Marina

This run/walk in Picton is fun for all ages and fitness levels. Choose from four courses ranging from a 24km stretch between Anakiwa and Picton to a 2km dash around Picton Marina, and enjoy beautiful Marlborough Sounds views along the way. Finish at Picton's waterfront with a festival atmosphere.



AS VOTED BY LOCALS:

Things to do in Blenheim / Te Waiharakeke

1. Hit the trails of the Wither Hills Farm Park

On foot or by mountain bike, from gentle to challenging, the variety of tracks that traverse this public farm park all come with magnificent views over Blenheim, the Wairau Valley, Cook Strait and beyond.

2. See a beach sunrise at Rarangi or Whites Bay/Pukatea

Pitch your tent or park the caravan at the Department of Conservation camps at Rarangi Beach or Whites Bay, make a coffee and watch the sun rise over Cloudy Bay.

3. Stock up at the Sunday Farmers' Market.

From freshly picked fruit and vegetables to local cheeses, eggs, meat, gourmet treats, breakfast and coffee, the Marlborough Farmers' Market at Blenheim's A&P Showgrounds is a great way to find the region's best flavours in a relaxed environment.

4. Discover Blenheim's history at Brayshaw Heritage Park

Stroll the high street of Beavertown, lined with original Marlborough buildings and memorabilia, to experience what life was like for Blenheim's earliest residents, and pop into the Marlborough Museum to learn more.

5. Experience pie perfection

A Marlborough institution, the Burleigh Gourmet Pie is an absolute must-taste – visit their home base in Blenheim and try them all to find your favourite.

6. Eat dumplings by the fire at Grovetown Hotel

A classic Kiwi pub from the outside, a Japanese/Kiwi fusion restaurant and bar on the inside – stop in to the historic Grovetown Hotel on State Highway 1 north of Blenheim for a friendly beer with a side of dumplings.

7. Fly into the past at the Omaka Aviation Heritage Centre

An unassuming hangar near Blenheim holds one of New Zealand's best historic aviation collections, including pieces from Sir Peter Jackson's own collection, magnificently displayed in dramatic WW1 and WW2 exhibitions.

8. Tour Blenheim's art scene

Create your own art trail around Blenheim, from the Millennium Public Art Gallery to Brian Badcock's private gallery, and be sure to check the stunning large scale murals around the town centre.

9. Take a walk down the garden path

Marlborough has several renowned gardens of significance, such as Upton Oaks near Blenheim, that are worth visiting whether your fingers are green or not. Stroll the paths, admire the landscape and be inspired.

10. All aboard at The Wine Station

The Wine Station, based at Blenheim's historic railway station, has 80 premium wines available for tasting on tap, so you can experience the best Marlborough wines in one location.

11. Walk along the Taylor River

With views stretching to the hills and mountains, and a flat, paved walkway, the Taylor River Reserve is the perfect place to take a stroll or bike ride with the family and unwind.

12. Find urban flavours in Blenheim

Get a taste of Blenheim's varied café and restaurant scene, from a delicious Marlborough wine or craft beer among friends, to local and international flavours, all within easy walking distance.

13. Stroll the shops

Explore central Blenheim's independent fashion and gift stores, or find what you need at familiar brand outlets, with plenty of stops for great coffee.

14. Music and more

There's plenty of musical and performance talent to be found at regular gigs and open mic events at venues, cafés and cellar doors in and around Blenheim. Look online, ask around or simply drop in.

15. A night at the theatre

From the bright lights of the big stage at the modern ASB Theatre to the intimate charm of the Boathouse Theatre, there are always plenty of local and visiting productions on the performance calendar.

16. Explore the Wairau Lagoons and Waverley shipwreck

A flat, easy walking track leads to the beautiful Wairau Lagoons, offering stunning views to the hills and Te Pokohiwi/Boulder Bank, where the first Māori arrived more than 800 years ago.

17. Soar over Marlborough in a vintage aeroplane

Take off in a De Havilland DH83C Fox Moth, Boeing Stearman, Yakovlev Yak-3, or Avro Anson Mk.1 for a scenic flight over beautiful Blenheim and beyond, or a thrilling speed experience with PMH Aviation and the Omaka Aviation Heritage Centre.

18. Explore the Grovetown Lagoon by bike

Grovetown Lagoon is a rare and beautifully restored wetland around an oxbow lake with wildlife and views. Bike from Blenheim via an off-road cycleway to Grovetown and follow the lagoon track.



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
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RENWICK & WAIRAU

The heart of New Zealand's largest wine industry, the small town of Renwick is surrounded by an incredible choice of cellar doors, set among stunning scenery. Explore the popular Golden Mile of wine, or venture further into the Wairau Valley for more wineries, from the organic and boutique to iconic.

AS VOTED BY LOCALS:

Things to do in Renwick & Wairan

1. Explore cellar doors by bike

Slow down and pedal your way between the wineries, drinking in the scenery and vineyards between tastings of amazing wines. Hire bikes, pick up a wine map and tour cellar doors at your leisure, or choose a guided tour.

2. Long, leisurely lunches

Sit down for a delicious feast of local produce perfectly matched with an exquisite wine at a winery restaurant. Dine al fresco under the Marlborough sun, or relax indoors by a cosy open fire.

3. Visit Makana Chocolate Factory

Interrupt your tour of Marlborough wine country with a cheeky chocolate fix. Taste handmade chocolate with enticing local flavours such as pinot noir truffles and choose some to savour later.

4. Leave room for gin

Taste delicious local gin and craft beer at the coolest little tasting room in Marlborough, The Gin Room, the home of Roots Marlborough Dry Gin and other rare boutique producers, is based at the Vines Village.

5. Sip Moa Beer and play games in the garden

Do something different in the heart of wine country: Enjoy a delicious beer at the original Moa Brewery and play corn hole in the garden, best enjoyed with the delicious food from the on-site food truck.

6. Learn from the experts with a guided wine tour

Treat yourself to an insiders' view of the Marlborough wine industry. Whether you choose a fun group tour or opulent private experience, your guides' local knowledge and passion for the wines you'll taste make for a brilliant wine experience.

7. Find art and gifts among the vines

Shop for gifts and admire Marlborough art at the Sounds Reflection shop, Return to Eden Art Gallery and the Dudson Scott Gallery.

8. Bike alongside the Wairau River

Take the family and spend a day exploring the Wairau River by bike, interspersed with a delicious lunch and local wine. Start at the forested Conders Bend Mountain Bike Park before following the stopbank downstream, diverting to a nearby restaurant or café, with a swim to finish.

9. Hit the slopes at Rainbow Ski Area

Just a two-hour drive from Blenheim, hit the slopes with the whole family, hire a toboggan or simply play in the snow and enjoy the mountain views. Always carry chains or catch the shuttle from the bottom carpark.

10. Enjoy an exceptional dinner experience at arbour or Harvest Restaurant

Experience flavours from Marlborough and beyond with exceptional cuisine at Two Hats restaurant arbour. Try their tasting menu or ask about local favourites. Or indulge all your senses at Harvest Restaurant and taste authentic cuisine made from their Mibrasa Charcoal oven.

11. Visit the Pot Shed

Adorn your garden or home with a new favourite piece from the Pot Shed. Explore their range of artisan handcrafted pots, urns, planters, statues, wall art and fountains from all over the world and be sure to treat yourself to a colourful bunch of flowers before you go.

12. Have a pint at the Cork & Keg

A classic English pub in the heart of Renwick and wine country with historic relics and features, the Cork & Keg is the perfect place for dinner and a pint (or choose from the wine list) after a hard day exploring the region.

13. Get lost in the Omaka Maize Maze

When the maize is high, the maze is at its best. Each year the course is redesigned for a brand new challenge, and each week the maze has a new theme. Open on Sundays from late January for just eight weeks.

14. Taste sensational strawberries

For a few precious months each year, the glasshouses at Hedgerows Hydroponic Strawberries come alive with the delicious red fruit – buy yours fresh at Hedgerows' shop and enjoy a real fruit ice cream.

15. Stay among the vines

Truly immerse yourself in Marlborough wine country by exploring the vineyards by day and staying by night. Indulge in a luxury suite at the Vintners Retreat, Hans Herzog Vineyard Cottage, St Leonard's Vineyard Cottages, or a beautiful bed & breakfast.

16. Stay in a wine barrel with Marlborough Wine Barrel Cabins

On a hillside above a secluded valley are two wine barrel cabins, perfect for two. With views of vineyards and gardens, each barrel is beautifully furnished and has an outdoor shower under a handmade mosaic wall.

17. Taste wine at Clos Henri Chapel

Drive into the beautiful Wairau Valley to visit this quaint boutique cellar door. Taste the result of 10 generations of winegrowing by the Bourgeois family, from the soils of Sancerre to Marlborough, in the pews of a converted chapel.

18. Golf, sunshine and fine wine

Tee off with vineyard views at the Marlborough Golf Club; one of New Zealand's oldest courses. Challenge yourself around the lakes and creeks, then stay for a fine local wine at the 19th.

19. Stop in at the Vines Village

Vines Village is nestled amongst many of the region's best cellar doors. It is the perfect place to explore and taste some of Marlborough's finest produce.

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
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PICTON Waitohi

& Queen Charlotte Sound / Tōtaranui

With stunning natural beauty, delicious local seafood and rich culture and history, Picton/Waitohi and Queen Charlotte Sound/ Tōtaranui are brilliant to explore and discover. Stroll Picton's waterfront and many shops and cafés, stay at a remote Sounds lodge, take a scenic or seafood cruise and walk or bike the Queen Charlotte Track.



AS VOTED BY LOCALS:

Things to do Picton & Queen Charlotte Sound / Totaranni

1. Walk or mountain bike the stunning Queen Charlotte Track

Strap on your helmet or tie up your boots and head out on the 72km Queen Charlotte Track. Walk or ride the track in two to three days, staying at amazing lodges along the way with your luggage transferred by boat, or do a day trip with water taxi transfers from Picton. (Ship Cove/Meretoto to Kenepuru Saddle closed to bikes during summer.)

2. Summit the highest mountain in the Marlborough Sounds

At 1203m, Mt Stokes/Pororangi provides unrivalled vistas of the Marlborough Sounds and far beyond. The track follows a ridgeline through moss-clad forests and ferns to a plateau of rare alpine herbs at the top, and a clear view to blue Endeavour Inlet below.

3. Take an art tour and visit local galleries and artists

With a growing art scene, central Picton has plenty to admire. Visit the Diversion Gallery and Artofact for fine art, Raukara for gifts and do a free tour at the private Stevenson Collection.

4. Walk inside a real convict ship

The impressively large timber hull of the last surviving convict ship that took convicts to Australia, and the oldest surviving merchant ship left in the world, is carefully preserved in Picton. The Edwin Fox Ship and Visitor Centre is full of information and artefacts and lets you go into the ship.

5. See Marlborough from above

A great way to truly appreciate the scale and complex landforms of the Marlborough Sounds is from the air. Take a scenic flight with Pelorus Air for brilliant views, with the option of a remote beach landing.

6. Start your day in a kayak

With glassy, clear water, mornings in the Marlborough Sounds, before the first hint of a breeze, are magic. Rent a sea kayak in Picton or Linkwater and head out into Queen Charlotte Sound/ Tōtaranui to paddle between the bays surrounded by birdsong and the splash of a seal, or do a guided tour.

7. Cruise into the Sounds

One of the best ways to explore the Marlborough Sounds is by getting out on the water. Board a cruise in Picton with Cougar Line or Beachcomber to a brilliant destination, taste fresh seafood on the Seafood Odyssea Cruise or take the whole family on the Motuara Bird Sanctuary Cruise.

8. Deliver post on a real mail boat

Join New Zealand Post's rural mail delivery service with a difference in Queen Charlotte Sound/Tōtaranui by boarding the Beachcomber Mail Boat Cruise. Enjoy the stunning scenery, keep your eye out for wildlife and see remote properties beautiful locations.

9. Swim with dolphins

Tick the magic of dolphin swimming off your bucket list with E-Ko Wildlife Tours from Picton, or do a dolphin watching tour and watch the graceful marine mammals from above, in the shelter of the Marlborough Sounds.

10. Head out on a fishing charter

Take advantage of the great Marlborough Sounds fishing by roping in the experts, such as Sounds Connection Fishing Charters. Put in the rod in search of blue cod and more in the shelter of the Sounds, or venture out further for a bigger challenge.

11. Visit nature sanctuaries

Cruise from Picton to Blumine Island, Motuara Island and Kaipupu Point to see brilliant native birdlife, and check if the little blue penguins/kororā are home in their nesting boxes, among stunning native bush and sea views.

12. Discover Ship Cove/Meretoto

Visit the start of the Queen Charlotte Track, where Māori and Europeans first met in the Marlborough Sounds, learn about why the cove is significant to iwi and was Captain James Cook's favourite anchorage, all among beautiful scenery.

13. Stay on the water's edge at a seaside lodge

Wake up to amazing views and the promise of delicious food and wine at a beautiful Marlborough Sounds lodge. Book a room, suite or apartment at Punga Cove, Furneaux Lodge, Bay of Many Coves, Mahana Lodge or Lochmara Lodge.

14. Feed the fish at Double Cove

Just across the water from Picton is a marine reserve where the blue cod wait for you to bring their lunch. Bring your own boat or Marlborough Tour Company's Sounds Nature Cruise to feed the resident tame fish.

15. Walk the Snout Track

This 3-hour return bush walk to the end of the peninsula that separates Picton and Waikawa, called The Snout, rewards you with incredible views into Queen Charlotte Sound/Totaranui. For a shorter walk option, there's a viewpoint around the halfway point.

16. Shop Picton

Picton's high street and Marlborough Creative Artisans in the Mariners Mall is a feast of giftware, clothing, jewellery, art and crafts. Spend time browsing leisurely, and find that special gift.

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Kaipupu Point Wildlife Sanctuary

Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary is a community project which aims to restore a 40 hectare 'mainland island' in Picton harbour. Only a tenminute boat ride from Picton, the Sanctuary can be accessed by private boat, water taxi or kayak. It is free to visit but donations are greatly appreciated. Allow 1.5 - 2 hours to leisurely walk around the 2.7 km circular track.

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HAVELOCK Pelorus Sound / Te Hoiere

Havelock and Pelorus Sound/Te Hoiere are places to stay a while and delve a little deeper. Experience areas of the Marlborough Sounds that are off the beaten track, taste incredible local seafood including world-famous Greenshell[™] Mussels and explore fascinating history from early Māori navigators forging the first paths to gold rush days.





Things to do Havelock & Pelorus Sound / Te Hoiere

1. Walk or mountain bike the epic Nydia Track

An exhilarating ride packed with brilliant views and Marlborough Sounds scenery, the Nydia Track (experienced grade) can be ridden in a day, or – better still – two. Stay at beautiful Nydia Bay at a DOC campsite or treat yourself to a night and dinner at the characterful On The Track Lodge.

2. Walk up to the Onahau Lookout

Get a water taxi to Mistletoe Bay and walk up the track to Onahau Lookout. Enjoy panoramic views over the Marlborough Sounds.

3. Eat fresh Greenshell[™] Mussels in Havelock

Known as the Greenshell[™] Mussel capital of the world, surely there's no better place to enjoy this delicious Marlborough specialty than Havelock. Sit down to a bowl of freshly steamed mussels at a cosy café, al fresco overlooking the marina, or board the Greenshell Mussel Cruise and taste mussels at the source.

4. Mix art with scenery

Visit local galleries and artists in and around Havelock. Pop into The Gallery Havelock on the main street to see works by Marlborough artists, and head onto beautiful Queen Charlotte Drive to visit artists at their home galleries.

5. Play mini golf in Linkwater

The Sounds Mini Golf is Marlborough's newest mini golf course with a twist. Fun for the whole family, the unique and creative course is surrounded by rural scenery.

6. Cruise the Sounds

The best way to see vast Pelorus Sound/Te Hoiere, larger yet quieter than neighbouring Queen Charlotte Sound/Tōtaranui, is out on the water. Take a boat cruise from Havelock and see beautiful remote bays and coves.

7. Be a sea postie for a day

Board the Pelorus Mail Boat in Havelock to deliver the mail on one of New Zealand's oldest sea post services. Experience stunning scenery in areas of Pelorus/Te Hoiere and Kenepuru Sounds rarely seen by visitors, and meet friendly locals as they collect their mail on the jetties.

8. Land the big one on a fishing charter

The Marlborough Sounds are known for great fishing, so be sure to try your luck with the benefit of local knowledge on a fishing charter from Havelock or Ōkiwi Bay. Take the whole family in the sheltered inner Sounds, or head for the excitement of big snapper and kingfish around D'Urville Island/Rangitoto ki te Tonga.

9. Wake up to sea views at a remote lodge

Swap the hustle and bustle for birdsong, native bush and glassy seas at a lodge in Pelorus/Te Hoiere or Kenepuru Sounds. Drive or boat to The Portage Hotel, Te Mahia Resort, The Lodge at Te Rawa or Hopewell Lodge.

10. Havelock Museum

With relics and photographs from the area's past as a gold rush town, timber port and more, Havelock Museum is a great way to learn more about this fascinating region. You won't miss it – look for the locomotive on the high street.

11. Take a dip at Pelorus Bridge

A must-do stop on State Highway 6 between Nelson and Blenheim, the Pelorus River is the perfect spot for a refreshing river swim. Dive off the rocks into the crystal-clear water and get an ice cream at the shop.

12. Channel your inner hobbit

Jump in a kayak and ride the rapids of the Pelorus River, one of the most famous filming locations of The Hobbit movies, with Pelorus Eco Adventures. The Hobbit Kayak Tour follows in the wake of Bilbo and his friends from The Desolation of Smaug.

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

Things to do in South Marlborough

1. Visit gardens of significance

Experience a very special part of South Marlborough at Paripuma, a unique native garden on the very edge of the wild, rugged Pacific Ocean, near Seddon. Or head to Barewood Garden, a stunning semi-formal country garden that roams across four acres in the spectacular Awatere Valley.

2. Drive Yealands' White Road

This iconic self-drive tour in the lower Awatere Valley is a Marlborough must-do, from the spectacular ocean and mountain vistas to the experience of being on a large-scale sustainable vineyard, best finished with a tasting at the cellar door.

3. Discover South Marlborough wines

The Awatere Valley is one of Marlborough's most important wine subregions, with unique, boundary-pushing terroirs stretching from mountains to the Pacific Coast – take a guided tour with Tupari Wines, see their cellar door at The Station café or visit Yealands.

4. Walk on the beach to the Cape Campbell Lighthouse

Walk from Marfells Beach to the Cape Campbell Lighthouse (which starred in Hollywood film The Light Between Oceans). The Lighthouse is accessible by beach at low tide - do a day walk, or book a stay at the Lighthouse Keepers' Huts (closed in winter).

5. Experience New Zealand's largest high country station (open seasonally)

Molesworth Station is rich in culture, history and scenery, and it's a great adventure to drive or bike the Molesworth road – travel independently or do a guided tour for in-depth local knowledge and see more of the Molesworth and neighbouring stations.

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

Getting here

BY AIR

Air New Zealand has several daily direct flights to Marlborough Airport, near Blenheim, from Auckland and Wellington.

Sounds Air flies direct from Wellington to Koromiko Airport near Picton and Marlborough Airport, and direct flights to Marlborough from Wellington, Paraparaumu and Christchurch.

BY SEA

The Bluebridge and Interislander passenger and vehicle ferries cross Cook Strait from Wellington to Picton several times daily.

BY ROAD

Marlborough is well-connected by state highways and bus services from Christchurch, Nelson and the West Coast. Blenheim's public bus visits Picton, Renwick and Marlborough Airport on selected days.

BY RAIL

The Coastal Pacific train travels from Christchurch to Picton via Blenheim along the scenic Kaikōura coast. During summer, the historic Marlborough Flyer train schedules special trips.



Getting around (

Marlborough Sounds

Explore the many bays, inlets and coves of the beautiful Marlborough Sounds by road, boat, bike or on foot. Do a road trip by car or campervan, board a tour or water taxi from Picton or Havelock, rent a kayak or walk or bike the incredible Queen Charlotte Track.

Blenheim/Waiharakeke

Park and enjoy the town's many restaurants, cafés and shops on foot, or join a guided tour or hop on/hop off bus to explore the cellar doors further afield. Hire a bike, take Blenheim's public bus, and walk or bike the Wither Hills.

Picton/Waitohi

Explore Queen Charlotte Sound/Tōtaranui on a scenic or seafood cruise, by water taxi or mail boat, hire a kayak, walk or mountain bike local tracks or simply stroll Picton's town centre and marina.

Havelock & Pelorus/Te Hoiere

Board a scenic cruise, water taxi or mail boat to explore Pelorus/Te Hoiere, Kenepuru and Mahau Sounds, or drive the scenic Kenepuru Road. Walk or bike the many local tracks.

Renwick & Wairau

Renwick and the Wairau Valley have many cellar doors all within close proximity – visit year-round by bike (available for hire), car or guided tour.

Awatere & Pacific Coast

Take the train or drive the scenic road south, or join a guided tour, for spectacular mountain and ocean views and wine. Explore the Molesworth Road during summer months by car or bike.
